

## **Dr Nancy Birdsall**

Nancy Birdsall is president emeritus and a senior fellow at the Center for Global Development, which she co-founded in 2001.

Prior to launching the Center, Dr. Birdsall served for three years as senior associate and director of the Economic Reform Project at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. Her work at Carnegie focused on issues of globalization and inequality, as well as on the reform of the international financial institutions.

From 1993 to 1998, Dr. Birdsall was executive vice-president of the Inter-American Development Bank, the largest of the regional development banks.

Before joining the IDB, she spent 14 years in research, policy, and management positions at the World Bank, including as director of the Policy Research Department.

Dr. Birdsall has authored over 100 published papers, and is the author, co-author, or editor of more than a dozen books. Her most recent publications include **Cash on Delivery: A New Approach to Foreign Aid** and **New Ideas on Development after the Financial Crisis**, co-edited with Francis Fukuyama. Shorter pieces of her writing have appeared in dozens of US and Latin American newspapers and periodicals.

Her most recent work focuses on global governance and the international financial institutions, women's empowerment and its relationship to reproductive choices, and the financing of global public goods for development.

Birdsall serves on the Board of Directors of the International Food Policy Research Council (IFPRI), the African Population and Health Research Center, and Mathematica. She is a member of the Williams College Center for Development Economics Visiting Committee. She has chaired the board of the International Center for Research on Women and has served on the boards of the Social Science Research Council, Overseas Development Council, and Accion. She has also served on committees and working groups of the National Academy of Sciences.

She holds a PhD in economics from Yale University and an MA in international relations from the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies.
